In the Gospel (Mark 4:26-34) Jesus tells two parables about the growth of the Kingdom of God. Each has a different purpose. The first emphasizes the seed's own growth. The farmer can neither give the seed-grain the power to grow nor influence its gradual growth: "The soil produces its fruit by itself." It is not as if the man has nothing to do - he must prepare the field and sow the seed. Yet the main work is done by God, while the man 'goes to bed and gets up again day after day." The Kingdom of God has its own rules that are not forced on it by men; it is not a product of technology. The seed, the blade, the ear, the full grain, the ripeness – all belong to the Kingdom's own structure and are not human achievements. The second parable indicates this as well: the fully grown fruit, from a seed that initially seemed contemptuous to men, proves in the end to be larger than anything man could have accomplished by himself. And the harvest? It will be God's harvest,

but will be on behalf of the man who has prepared the soil and sowed the seed. God harvests, as the lazy servant in the parable of the talents put it, "where he has not sown." Yet fundamentally the harvest is for both God and man: for God appoints the industrious servant to rule over a large realm. - from Light of the Word, by Hans Urs von Balthasar




June 13 is the Memorial of Saint Anthony of Padua, Priest, Friar, Doctor of the Church and Patron of the Diocese of Beaumont. According to *The Liturgy of the Hours*, St Anthony was born in Lisbon, Portugal near the end of the twelfth century. He joined the Canons Regular of Saint Augustine, but, shortly after ordination to the priesthood, transferred to the Friars Minor (Franciscans) to devote himself to spreading the Faith, among African peoples. He had his greatest success, however, preaching in France and Italy and converting heretics. He was the first member of this Order to teach theology to his brethren. His sermons are notable for their learning and gentleness. St Anthony died at Padua in 1231. According to The Oxford Dictionary of Saints, since the seventeenth century, Anthony has been frequently invoked as the finder of lost articles, because a novice who borrowed his psalter without permission, was obliged to return it because of a fearsome apparition. Anthony's devotion to the poor was aptly recalled by the nineteenth century institution of Saint Anthony's Bread. This charity, devoted to the

relief of the starving and the needy, still flourishes,

especially in the developing world. In Sicily, huge

loaves in the shape of a crown are still baked on his
