January 16, 2022 The Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

Father Ross will be at the priests' retreat this week and so Mass will not be offered.

The Church's Liturgy sees a threefold dawning of God's glory in Jesus in the feast of the Epiphany: God's glory dawns on the Magi, in the theophany at the Jordan (celebrated last Sunday), and in Jesus' first miracle, at Cana, where he "revealed his glory." (Jn 2:11) Poor folk invite Jesus, his mother, and his disciples to their wedding, but they run out of wine. Mary, already representing the caring and interceding Church, turns to the Son, which may seem odd, since she has probably not seen any outward miracle by him yet. Yet she knows all this is necessary: she knows of the holy power within him. Aware that the only wonder God has assigned to him is the Cross, Jesus does not want to be forced into the role of a wonderworker, which the insatiable throng will demand of him again and again from this point onward. Then comes what is probably the most beautiful word from Mary, by which she leaves everything up to him and at the same time instructs the servants about obeying him.: "Do whatever he tells you!" (Jn 2:5b) Although unnoticed by others, this is really the dawning of her glory. Jesus does not resist her, for his mother's word is very close to that which occupies him most inwardly. The account does not tell us whether people even noticed the transformation of what was useless into a very precious commodity, whether Jesus was celebrated as a wonderworker, something he always wanted to avoid. The account merely says that his disciples "believed in him." That is the only outcome that he would consider a success. Although he tried to keep his later miracles quiet, many of them were bandied about as sensations, making his mission more difficult. – from Light of the Word, by Hans Urs von Balthasar
