Holy Thursday - April 14 - Mass of the Lord's Supper at 6:00 p.m. (No Morning Mass)


Good Friday - April 15 - The Celebration of the Passion of the Lord at 6:00 p.m.

Curiously all the texts of today's Mass point toward the future, toward God's salvation, which creates new things and toward which we are hastening. Moreover, this orientation toward the future serves to introduce Holy Week. It is precisely here that the new, the final salvation is accomplished. Our life, in its entirety, will consist in approaching this act of God. The Gospel (John 8:1-11) shows us sinners who accuse another sinner in Jesus' presence. Bending over to write on the ground, Jesus seems to be absent. He breaks his silence only twice: the first time to gather accusers and accused together into their shared culpability; the second time to give voice to his forgiveness, since no one is left to condemn another. In the light of Jesus' silent suffering for all of us, every accusation has to fall silent. He has suffered for all in order to gain heaven's forgiveness for all and for that reason no one can accuse anyone else in Gods' presence. – from Light of the Word, by Hans Urs von Balthasar



LENTEN OBLIGATIONS

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence. Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence.

FASTING

Catholics from age 18 through 59 are permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal.

ABSTINENCE

Catholics age 14 and up abstain from meat (mammals & fowl) on Fridays in honor of the sacrifice of Christ.
