

Ongoing Catechism

Preparing for Communion

At last, we are almost there! Like a movie that has built up to the climax, everything that has gone on during the Mass has led up to the coming moment – Jesus Christ is with us in the Eucharist! Now granted, Jesus has been present with us since the Consecration – But His Body was being offered up to God as a sacrifice. Now, at this part of the Mass, we are with Jesus again, but this time He is the Risen Christ! When exactly does this happen? As mentioned earlier in the lesson, while we were praying the Lamb of God, the priest would break the Eucharistic Bread. During the breaking of the Bread, the priest takes a small piece of the Bread and drops It into the chalice that contains the Precious Blood of Jesus. This is called the *co-mingling* of the bread and wine.

As is often the case in the Mass, this small act is very rich in symbolism, for it represents the Risen Lord. At the consecration our Lord comes to the Bread and Wine separately, "This is My Body..." then "This is My Blood..." This shows that Jesus was offering His Body as a Sacrifice, for when our blood is separated from our body, we die. But with the co-mingling of the Eucharisted Bread and Wine, we see that the two are joined together again... Our Lord is Risen! This is why the Priest, no matter how many other priests or deacons are with him at the altar, will elevate the Host and the Chalice holding the Two together. "How does this happen?" you might ask? All I can say is, "It's a mystery!". But this is why, for the remainder of the Mass, if you receive the Eucharist under one Species, whether it is What looks like unleavened bread, or whether it's What tastes like wine from the chalice, you are receiving our Risen Lord and Savior Jesus Christ – Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity.

Pope Leo, in the 6th century, prayed that we become What we eat in the Eucharist! Yet, in the book of Revelation, "the Lamb" is the principal image of Christ. The Apostle John first sees the Lamb, slain in sacrifice though standing in God's presence. The vision is an expression of the timeless sacrifice of Jesus being offered eternally to the Father. All of creation participates in this cosmic worship of God in the heavenly liturgy. Whenever we celebrate the Eucharist on earth, we become part of the everlasting offering of Christ that John describes in his vision. So, if we are to pray like Pope Leo that "we become What we eat", that also means that, as St. Paul writes in Romans, we should make of ourselves "living sacrifices"!
